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

### The Cantor's Corner Cantor Andrea Raizen

Hanukkah is fast approaching and it's time to clean out last year's wax from the menorah, start with a fresh box of



candles and brush up on the blessings and songs that accompany the lighting ceremony. Most of us can remember that we place the first nights' candle on the right side and add each new one

to the left, while lighting from left to right. If you get confused, think "set to the left and light to the right." Upon lighting, we recite 3 blessings on the first night and two on all the others. Many follow this by singing Maoz Tzur, Rock of Ages. But what has happened to the singing of Hanerot Halalu? I know that many of you know to sing this after lighting, but if you do not, read on and consider adding this to your repertoire.

The words of *Hanerot Halalu* were written over 1500 years ago and even appear in the Talmud. The song says:

"These candles that we light are for the miracles and for the wonders and for the rescues and for the wars that You made for our ancestors in those days at this time, through Your holy kohanim [priests]. And all eight days of Hanukkah, these candles are holy, and we do not have permission to use them but, rather, to look upon them, in order to thank and praise Your great name for Your miracles and for Your wonders and for Your rescues."

In a nutshell, thank you God for the miracles and the wonders that you brought about at the time of the Maccabees that insured the survival of the Jewish people and allow us to continue to pass down the traditions and teachings that we hold so dear. What makes this prayer unusual is that it teaches us an important Jewish law. The law it teaches is that we are not to make use of the Hanukkah candles while they're burning. Rather, we are only

permitted to enjoy them. No similar law applies to Shabbat candles. There's no objection to, for example, eating by the light of Shabbat candles. But Hanukkah candles are different. They're special. We aren't supposed to make use of their light, only to enjoy it. That's why we use a shamash, or "helper" candle, and leave it burning while the other candles are burning. We use the light of the shamash to see, and we enjoy the light coming from the other candles. We are commanded to light the candles and then sit in their presence and enjoy them, for at least a half hour or until they burn out. This may be how the practice of spinning the dreidel arose, children that came up with a game to play while sitting in the presence of the candles.

What an amazing religious obligation, to sit in the presence of little candles and simply be. We don't have to do anything. We just have to bask in the light of those candles. For some of us, that might be a challenge. It might seem tedious. But maybe that's what it takes to truly appreciate a miracle, the ability to sit back and not think about doing anything other than appreciating the moment.

When we light our candles today, they should be transformed from mere wax and wicks to a state of holiness, as the song tells us. As you look at the flames each night, think of those traditions, stories and objects that have been passed along by your family thanks to the efforts of the Maccabees, and then ask yourself how you can pay this forward. In other words, how can you become a modern day Maccabee? What do you and your family value so highly that you feel must be transmitted to the next generation and what can you do to ensure that? Hanerot Halalu encourages us to take the time to focus solely on this message before diving into our latkes and other goodies.

I wish you all a *Chag Urim Sameach*, a happy and inspired festival of lights.

### HANUKKAH'S UNTOLD STORY: FINDING OUR MIDDLE WAY IN THE WAKE OF THE MACCABEES

We all know the story of Hanukkah, or so we think... This Jewish winter solstice



celebration commemorates an important historical moment in the evolution of Jewish civilization as a

successful merging of modern and traditional sensibilities, even though the Hasmonean Dynasty lost its independence early on (63 BCE). But the untold story of Hanukkah is really more of how the Maccabees saved Israel from a twofold Greek danger: namely, while the Maccabees may have eradicated one kind of Hellenism (idolatry), they replaced it with another (a cultural synthesis of Judaism and Hellenism). The challenge of Hellenism in those days (as with contemporary American culture nowadays), remains much the same--retaining our particular identity while being immersed in universal culture and values. How does that interaction enhance rather than weaken the Judaism we are committed to passing on to the coming generations?

This holiday season, we would be well served to look at the Hanukkah story through its historical lens, a way of reading the tradition that as Conservative Jews we champion. Hanukkah is teaching us how to truly navigate living this "middle way." While the Greeks succeeded, albeit at a cost, by ruling the Hellenic world, the Jews succeeded by their knowledge of the unity of God and the divine world rule. Setting up an inner barrier against surrendering to Hellenism may have been necessary for the Jews to preserve past gains, but it was not sufficient to enrich their spirit and inner life. Our

celebration of Hanukkah needs to acknowledge that the internal Jewish reconciliation with Hellenism begins with the Maccabees, but it must continue with us!

Back then it was the culture of the gymnasium, theater, amphitheater and games at the hippodrome, while today it is the culture of travel sports and pick -up games, rapid technology, social networking and of course, arts and culture! The inspiration that emerges from our surrounding cultures needs to be experienced with discernment to nourish our Jewish identity without surrendering our intrinsic spiritual values. Discernment comes from the lenses we use to see our lives with greater perspective.

As a communal family at Beth Abraham, we have been honing a variety of lenses to rebalance our Jewish compasses in our exploratory kaleidoscope of Friday night Kabbalat Shabbat prayer experiences, as well as in our lifelong learning sessions. Learning How To Learn was a well-attended, interactive survey of the Jewish bookshelf, seeing how and why our great books affect the way we think as Jews and give us a common language of shared experience. At Shabbat kiddush lunch we have been exploring our Pilgrimage Through the Psalms to rediscover why this prayerful poetry is so resonant with our spiritual journeys. And in our next lifelong learning sessions on Mondays at noon we will embark upon A Quest for Meaningful Living Through Mysticism: Kabbalah as Jewish Mystical Experience. We will explore major themes in the Jewish mystical tradition— called Kabbalah—including various understandings of God, Torah, the mitzvot, and prayer that can (re)

inspire our Jewish practices.

family through meet & greet parlor meetings. All of these encounters are intended to bring us together in our journey to appreciate our history and begin sharing our hopes and dreams for the future of the Beth Abraham Synagogue family. This is the genius of Judaism and the Maccabean middle way that we continue celebrating—to see the spiritual in the material world and culture around us as a gift worthy of uplifting. May we continue to carry forth this blessing, in the words of the prophet Zechariah (4:7), "not by might, nor by power, but by My spirit."

### WHY THE NEED FOR LEGACY GIFTS?

I've been asked why the synagogue is asking for legacy gifts. "Why not let future congregants pay for the synagogue's

future expenses? After all, don't current congregants like me pay for the synagogue's current expenses?"

The answer is, not always and not entirely. Beth Abraham's current annual operating budget is intended to cover salaries, supplies, routine maintenance costs and much of the cost of the meaningful, vibrant programing that helps make Beth Abraham have the feel of community. The synagogue's goal is to fund the operating budget partially through dues and partially through donations. Annually, collected dues cover around 50% of the budget while typically contributions cover 25-35%. Sometimes special appeals are pursued in hopes of covering the remainder of operating costs. But more often than the synagogue would like, we run an operating expense deficit.

Additionally, the synagogue sometimes incurs other expenses outside those that are operating expenses. Major building repairs and system upgrades are required from time to time. Again, special appeals may cover a portion of these expenses, but not necessarily all of them.

How are these deficits met? Like many synagogues, one source for these needed funds is legacy giving. We have been fortunate that many generous and committed congregants have left bequests to Beth Abraham that have helped support the synagogue over the past decade in its times of financial need. The Beth Abraham Foundation manages a reserve of funds invested in safe, income-generating investments that allow the reserve to grow and to be available to help meet Beth Abraham's financial shortfalls.





### CONNECT: FREE LENDING LIBRARY

And now, as Monte Python would say, for something completely different. What

do BAS, Benjamin Franklin, Rav Aubrey and yours truly have in common? Well, it became clear at an informal meeting of Rav Aubrey, Elaine Arnovitz, yours truly, and my wife Claudia Birch when we were inspired to carry forward the legacy of Benjamin Franklin by opening a BAS "branch" free lending library, curated for your reading pleasure, in our lounge area just outside the existing library. Rav Aubrey was excited about finding new ways to engage the Beth Abraham community who are in the building, but not necessarily connecting to conventional, traditional prayer services—so as soon as I mentioned the role of Benjamin Franklin in launching the library system in what were then the 13 colonies, we realized the power of this model. Rav Aubrey then suggested emphasizing the link between Franklin and what we are trying to do in the 2nd floor lobby

area as a BAS "branch" free lending library. Each month, I will share recommendations, based on a special book in our collection, just like you would find in bookstores for staff recommendations once upon a time. Here's the history of the idea on one

foot: recall that Franklin arrived in Philadelphia in 1723 at the age of 17. Recognized for his skill as a printer, he quickly made contact with "likeminded men" who shared his intellectual curiosity. While still only 21 years old, he took the lead in forming a group known as the Junto, a



book club, in 1727. Except for libraries at Harvard and Yale, books were a rare commodity in the 13 colonies, but the 50 men who formed the group each had at least some books. Franklin convinced the group to hold the books at a central location and formed what became known as the Library Company, a legendary institution in the history of Philadelphia, in July, 1731. It still exists today as an important research library. Each man contributed a modest sum to form a fund to buy books. Each pledged to contribute every year. They began by buying books in London where the most important books of the time would be available. As might be expected, Franklin printed the first catalogue of the collection in 1741.

So the next time you are at Beth Abraham for Shabbat or in the building, feel free to browse the BAS "branch" free lending library curated collection in the 2nd floor lobby. Peruse at your pleasure and feel free to share these books with other curious minds. Each month, I and some other avid readers will share our recommended reading with you that you can find on the bookshelves. Enjoy!
