

## The Cantor's Corner Cantor Andrea Raizen



You may remember the film, "The Last Picture Show" set in 1951, in which a group of high school seniors come of age in a bleak North Texas

town that is slowly dying, both culturally and economically. It was a great movie, garnering eight Academy Award nominations and winning two for supporting actors. The only reason I mention this is, with the approach of Purim I feel like I am producing "The Last Purim Shpiel," at least for me as director.

Here at Beth Abraham, you have come to expect a shpiel as part of the Purim celebration, almost a halachic imperative. But where did this tradition originate? The humble yet beloved Purim shpiel ("play" in Yiddish) is the only genuine folk theater that has survived a thousand years of European culture, and in our day has morphed and flourished. According to historian Chone Shmeruk, the term Purim shpiel was found throughout Ashkenazic Jewry as early as the mid-1500s. The shpiel could be a poetic monologue, or a story portrayed by several actors, usually the story of Esther, but also other biblical stories, such as the selling of Joseph, Hannah and Samuel, or David and Goliath. Since most Jewish men were literate and traditionally educated, commentaries were also incorporated, along with satire directed at the rabbi, cantor, community leaders, and other authorities.

Purim shpiels were acted primarily by poor people like students, musicians, dancers, acrobats and artisans. They were performed either in large public venues like yeshivas, or especially for wealthy families, typically in their homes after the festive meal. If the community was small, the actors took great pains to

rehearse in secret and disguise themselves thoroughly so they would not be recognized to their shame. They walked through the streets from house to house, followed by hordes of excited children, who would crowd into or hang from the windows of the homes of the rich, in order to see the performance. In these homes the actors were rewarded in the form of money and/or food.

This year will mark the tenth show for which I have been responsible. Six of the shpiels were acquired and adapted from other sources like purimshpiels.com and Purim Shpiels R Us. Another four were conceived of and written in-house with the help of some of you. Four were based on Broadway musicals including, "Fiddler on the Roof," "The Sound of Music," "My Fair Lady," and "Oklahoma." Four used a musical genre, musician or group like Motown, The Beatles, Disco and Elvis. And who could forget our Purim in lockdown when we presented "Corona Purim" via Zoom? When it came time to think about yet another show, I was stumped. Between Chaya Vidal's seven wonderful shpiels prior to and within the time I took the helm, and those we have done since, I just couldn't think of a theme. I kept coming back to the idea of doing a retrospective of sorts, looking back on the previous shows. Thanks to the creative mind of Judy Chesen, we settled on a way to highlight some of our favorite moments.

This year's shpiel will look quite different from those of previous years. It will take on the look of a big awards show like the Oscars or the Tonys, complete with the red carpet. Our veteran shpielers will walk the red carpet, take time for photos and interviews in between featured numbers from the shpiels of the past that will tell the story of Purim. Some of the actors who originated a particular role are back to reprise their numbers, but you will see some new faces, as well. To get into the awards show spirit, we

#### THE HEALING POWER OF HOLY THEATRE

"...theatre is a vehicle, a means for self-study, self-exploration, a possibility of salvation." -Peter Brook, The Empty Space (1968)

I have always been inspired by English dramaturg, Peter Brook, who has championed what he calls a Holy Theatre, which brings a sense of inner self-reflection and plucks the cords of hope for redemption. In these challenging times filled with such collective grief and uncertainty, we can find solace in the uplifting power of stories and even turn to the healing power of the arts.

With this intention in our hearts and minds, you are invited to join us for "Heschel's Passover Eve" - a journey through the remarkable life of late, great Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel (January 11, 1907, Warsaw, Poland-December 23, 1972, New York). This is the story of one of our remarkable beacons of hope, who was always reminding us to pray with our feet. The twist is that this a captivating solo performance by an Israeli actor to American audiences for its very first English-language production, telling us a story we think we know, from Israeli eyes.

This play is meant to be a source of inspiration, as we come together, support one another, and share in a powerful theatrical experience together with our allies in the community. As part of our growing partnership with the World Zionist Organization, we are honored to partner with its arts and cultural liaison, called *Shazur*, and together we are thrilled to be bringing "Heschel's Passover Eve." Beth Abraham will be honored to host the Israeli theatre troupe *Shazur* in

solidarity with communities across the country for an intimate, educational theatrical experience in our synagogue.


This 45 minute play - an intimate portrait of Heschel, portrays moments that span his life from his time in Germany before the Holocaust to his relationship with Dr. Martin Luther King. In the Jewish prophetic tradition, "Heschel's Passover Eve" is a call to action for civil discourse and human rights that is as relevant now as it was when Dr. Heschel was marching arm-inarm with Dr. King. We need more encounters with compelling pieces of art, compelling historically and compelling intellectually, to help us examine those moments when we are called to acts of moral courage.

Further inspiration comes from knowing that proceeds from the costs of producing the play will go to relief efforts for the displaced residents of Otef Aza and Sderot.





# Library News — Off the Shelf

In a short but very fascinating book



titled, Destination Palestine: The Story of the Haganah Ship Exodus 1947, author Ruth Gruber details one of the most memorable

episodes in modern Jewish history - the the British presented the survivors of voyage of the Exodus. Gruber begins by affectionately dedicating the book to the people who made the voyage, and to the Haganah "boys" and the American crew who made it possible. A journalist, Gruber served as an eyewitness to the entire episode. The story begins on July 17, 1947 in Haifa. The Haganah "boys" made it widely known that the "refugee" ship Exodus would be headed for Palestine with 4554 passengers: 1,600 men, 1,282 women, 1,017 young people, and 655 children. These fortunate few, very likely all survivors of the Holocaust, might be thought of as the future of Israel. Elements of the British navy actually intercepted the ship on July18 about 20 miles off the coast of Palestine. That incident led to the outbreak of a resistance movement by the Jews in Palestine.

While the British made a show of force, they took control of the Exodus as the ship made its way into the port of Haifa flying what would be the Israeli flag. The British allowed the passengers to leave the ship, but they had every intention of sending them to Cyprus, as they did with all Jews considered illegal immigrants to Palestine. Gruber says that about 25,000 Jews arrived in Cyprus in one year.

Because of severe overcrowding in the camps, the British began to allow a mere 750 Jews a month to enter Palestine. Under increasing pressure, the British then allowed 500 orphaned children to enter Palestine. The British

of the Exodus by sending it to a port in France. The passengers on the Exodus then took matters into their own hands. They refused to stay in France or to go back to Cyprus.

The passengers on the Exodus endured oppressive heat and a severe shortage of both food and water. In the midst of this hardship the passengers launched a hunger strike. Finally, on August 22, the Holocaust with an impossible choice: leave the Exodus or be sent to Hamburg, Germany of all places, still occupied by the Americans, the British. the Russians and the French.


It did not seem possible that the British would actually follow through, but they did so in early September. Gruber says that as the Exodus sailed for Hamburg a young woman whispered to her, "Now you will see the birth of a Jewish

State." Gruber says that when the British

questioned the passengers in Hamburg, all of them answered the same way. Asked where they came from, they all said Palestine. Asked for their names, they all said Palestine. In a brief twopage epilogue, Gruber says the passengers from the Exodus managed to get out of the camp in small groups, perhaps with the cooperation of the British authorities, over a period of a couple of



decided, however, to make an example months. They made their way to ships waiting for them in French and Italian ports. They managed to arrive in Haifa just in time to celebrate Israel Independence Day on May 15, 1948. With a Jewish population estimated at only 680,000 at the time of Israeli independence the passengers from the Exodus represented more than a symbolic increase. As Gruber puts it,



they became the soldiers, workers and farmers alongside other Israelis. They had indeed become part of the future of Israel. The Jewish population of

Israel today is more than seven million!
